



Business Manager's Message

n the last three months of summer, we signed on board three new signatory contractors of Local 675, Tradewinds Cooling, LLC, APB Mechanical, LLC, and Narito Sheetmetal & Mechanical Corp.

After a long break, we kickstarted the Fall general membership meeting on September 9th with an educational video and slideshow at the Washington Middle School cafeteria. The topic of concern was the Pension Plan. Earlier, the Trust Fund Office sent out the informational material for the members to absorb and understand. Speaking for my staff and myself, we were very appreciative to the membership who attended the meeting for ratifying the changes that had to be made to keep the pension plan healthy. Last month I attended Phase II of the Newly Elected Business Manager's Seminar in Ann Arbor, Michigan which was in conjunction with the Instructor Training Program. I got to meet with my fellow new business managers again to share and discuss current topics affecting our locals. Some the training included UA jurisdiction, recapturing market share in the residential sector, and General current legal topics. President McManus was also one of the presenters sharing his knowledge to the new leaders.

Brother McManus again emphasized the importance of the Organizing Contribution which would provide key funding for the UA's number one initiative – growing market share in all sectors of our industry. As mentioned at the Union meeting, the Organizing Contribution is \$.10 for every hour worked by each UA member

working in our jurisdiction. The UA's new Organizing Contribution mandate went into effect July 1, 2019. Our local will make contributions from our General Fund, beginning September for the month of July.

I also attended the Negotiations and Trustee Seminar at the UA headquarter's new training facility in Annapolis, Maryland. Some topics discussed included basics of ERISA, fiduciary responsibilities, trust governance issues, plan operations, functions of service providers, nonexempt prohibited avoiding transactions, plan funding issues, and other responsibilities as a Union Trustee. The seminar also covered topics related to negotiations and understanding the collective bargaining process.

This month's newsletter features the nine Imi Loa Foundation scholarship winners. I met with each of the recipients and proud parents who attended the luncheon and they were all appreciative of the Union's support. We encourage our members to have your children or grandchildren apply for this one-time scholarship opportunity next year.

Let's not forget our 100th year anniversary coming around the corner. The theme for our centennial is *E Ho'omau*, which we interpret to mean "building on the past ... for a better tomorrow." Ho'omau we are told is the Hawaiian value of perseverance and persistence. We look forward to seeing you there to celebrate this important event with our Honorary Chairman, Brother Mark McManus.

Proposal for Regulating Apprentice Programs

Urgent Notice was sent out last month to our Local 675 membership at the request of General President Mark McManus regarding assistance to save our UA Apprenticeship Programs. Email sites were established so all UA members could send an email to the Department of Labor telling them to protect UA apprenticeships.

In June, the DOL proposed regulations to implement Industry-Recognized Apprenticeship Programs (IRAPs). The new IRAP would system give private organizations, such as employers and trade associations, free rein create new watered-down standards and certify subpar apprenticeship programs. McManus stated, "The UA spends \$250 million each year on training. In doing so, we've created the best workforce in the world of piping professionals. We're Built on Excellence and that's rooted in our apprenticeship training. We get the job done on time and on budget because of the level of skill our members bring to every job." He further stated, "Now greedy anti-union contractors want to destroy our

response nation-wide, our voices were heard. "I am proud of the support of our membership who are good skilled tradespeople and understand the importance of safety on the job," Business Manager Val Ceria said.

The General Membership Votes Unanimously to Ratify Pension Changes

After a spirited Q&A discussion, the General Membership on Monday, September 12, 2019 voted to ratify pension changes at the Washington Middle School Cafeteria. There were 98 members in attendance who viewed the educational videos on the pension plan – "How your Pension Plan Works," "Pension Plan Challenges," which explained the challenges we are currently facing, and "Pension Plan Changes," which described some of the items that the Board of Trustees had to make to lessen the cost to the plan. This included the new conditions for retiring prior to age 55 which were covered in a mailer sent out earlier to all members.

Business Manager Val Ceria introduced the power point presentation highlighting some of the challenges shown on the video and covered the permanent reallocation of current funds and permanent new monies that were the subject voted on for ratification by the membership. The Contractors also voted to approve the same and ratified the very next day.

Kaua'i County Council Votes to Improve Conservation Standards and Flexibility of Plumbing Code

The Union's Government Affairs Public Relations Director, and Kika Bukoski, worked diligently with the County Council of Kaua'i and was instrumental in the passage of Bill 2612 Draft 1. The County Council of Kaua'i recently passed the bill adopting the 2012 Uniform Plumbing Code with amendments, updating the plumbing code to provide the County Kaua'i its residents and improved standards for water resource use, conservation, and and allowing efficiencies, County, developers, contractors and homeowners with the flexibility employ alternate methods, materials, or engineered designs to achieve additional cost savings that may be available.

Most importantly to Kaua'i residents, as we continue to explore ways to address our state's ongoing housing crisis, Bill 2612 supports Kaua'i Mayor Kawakami's initiative and goal to provide additional and truly affordable housing options for the people of Kaua'i. Bill 2612 became law on Aug. 29, 2019.

The Uniform Plumbing Code contained in Bill 2612 was first adopted by the Kaua'i County Board of Supervisors in 1965 and has served the people of Kaua'i for nearly 55 years. As one of the oldest chartered labor organizations in Hawaii. Local 675 has been and remains committed to providing the people of Kaua'i County, and the state for that matter, with not only a highly-skilled workforce of dulylicensed plumbers and pipefitters, but with the opportunity for its residents and future workforce to pursue economic stability, selfsufficiency and an improved quality of life.
